

# JOHN ABBOTT COLLEGE COPYRIGHT POLICY

John Abbott College promotes compliance with copyright law and adheres to the Copibec General License Agreement and the Canadian Copyright Act ( R.S. 1985, c. C-42)

## What is Copyright?

Copyright law enables creators of works to control the use of their work. The law also provides reasonable access to works for the benefit of society as a whole.

## COPYRIGHT- PRINTED DOCUMENTS

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Photocopying over 20% a printed work requires individual clearance. The Bookstore can advise you on securing copyright permission.

## COPYRIGHT- MUSIC

The copying of print or sheet music is not covered under the existing licence with Copibec. You will need to contact the music publisher directly to secure permission.

John Abbott College is a member of the Society of Composers, Authors, and Music publishers of Canada (SOCAN) who administers performing rights. The Canadian Copyright Act and SOCAN permits the copying of musical (such as sheet music) for performance purposes only.

SOCAN deals with only **Performing rights**, which are the rights to perform a work in public. **Any other copying which is not intended for performance violates copyright.**

## COPYRIGHT – VIDEOS/DVDs/TV

You are violating Copyright if:

- You tape a T.V. program or radio broadcast to use in class without obtaining performance rights from the owner of the work
- You make a copy of a video, DVD, CDROM, CD or any other media to use in your classroom without public performance rights or obtaining permission from copyright owner.
- You show a video, DVD, CDROM, CD or any other media **rented** from a video store or a personal copy without purchasing public performance rights.
- You place a personal or borrowed copy of a video, DVD, CDROM, CD or any other media on library reserve for your students to use without obtaining permission from the copyright owner.

You are **not** violating Copyright if:

- You show a video, DVD, CDROM, CD or any other media from the John Abbott

Library collection which was purchased with public performance rights

## COPYRIGHT IN CYBERSPACE

Information on the Internet is copyrighted and free access to materials does not put them in the public domain.

You are violating copyright if:

- You copy a file, article, image or any other document from the Internet onto your own site, Blackboard, lesson plans, manuals or any other format unless granted permission by the author.
- Downloading and/or file sharing of video, audio and other works unless authorized by the copyright law or the owner of the work.

You are not violating copyright if:

- You place a link to the main home page of the Site that you want on your Web Site, Blackboard, lesson plans, handouts, manuals, or Power Point presentations.
